New Books in the Church Library

Donated by Pastor Webber:

Gathered Guests by Timothy H. Maschke. In this survey of worship in the Lutheran tradition, Maschke take his cue from Luther's maxim that God gathers people into the church, and as gathered guests, we come to His house to receive His blessing, to pray, praise, and give thanks. In worship, the author argues that life, liturgy, and theology intersect in remarkable and rich ways, and this gathering around Word and Sacrament both creates and defines a genuine evangelical style of worship. Women Pastors: The Ordination of Women in Biblical Lutheran Perspective, ed. By Matthew C. Harrison and John T. Pless. The essays in this volume represent Lutheran churches throughout the world. The essays are divided into four sections: Biblical studies, historical studies, systematic theology, and pastoral theology. CPH

A History of the Christian Church by Lars P. Qualben. This volume covers four main divisions of church history: 1. the organic relation between Christianity and the Old Testament religion, 2. the formative period of the Early Church, 3. the underlying principles of the Reformation and the Counter Reformation, and 4. the development of American Christianity. Other Books New to the Library:

Concordia Self-Study Commentary by Walter Roehrs. This commentary reflects a Christ-centered view of Bible history and prophecy. The book introductions provide the background and important features of the book so readers may see distinctive themes and purposes of the individual writings. Using the Revised Standard Version, the authors offer commentary on key versus, phrases, and words to help readers gain a proper understanding of Scripture. CPH

Illustrated Bible Handbook by Lawrence O. Richards. Including scores of maps, charts, photos, and illustrations, this is a visual guide to interpreting Scripture. Brief essays on historical and doctrinal matters, and concise summaries of every book in the Bible and practical insights

from in the Bible, give you a complete guide to the entire text. Amazon (We would advise caution with respect to some of the theological conclusions in this book.)

ASU Choral Concert - Music of the Reformation: Update

More information has become available regarding the ASU Choral Concert on October 18, "Music of the Reformation." Combined choirs will perform Bach's Cantata 80, "Ein' feste Burg ist unser Gott." The program will also include "He, Watching Over Israel" and "Heilig" by Mendelssohn, as well as "Geistliches Lied" by Brahms. The event will take place at the Tempe Center for the Arts. General admission tickets are \$10, available at the door or through the TCA website: www.tempe.gov/TC Also, contrary to what was reported in the August *Valley Evangel*, the ASU-sponsored concert that will be held on the following day – October 19 – will not include Lutheran sacred music.

New Luther film to air on PBS

A recently-released feature film, *Martin Luther: The Idea that Changed the World*, is set to air nationally on the Public Broadcasting System on September 12. In the Phoenix market this will be on Channel 8, from 7 to 9 p.m. Funded by Thrivent Financial, the film dramatizes the events that shaped Luther's life and thought, and examines the important spiritual questions with which he wrestled, such as "Who am I?" Devotion: "Let His Light Shine!"

"For God, who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," made His light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of God's glory displayed in the face of Christ." (2 Corinthians 4:6)



When the author and poet, Robert Louis Stevenson, was 12 yearsold, he found himself, one evening, looking out into the dark from his upstairs window, watching a man light the streetlamps. When his governess walked by, she asked, "What are you doing?" He replied, "I am watching a man cut holes in the darkness."

That's not a bad picture of what the Lord is asking of us, as He tells His followers, to "Go, and make disciples of all nations...." which means sharing with others, "the light of the knowledge of God's glory displayed in the face of Christ." Or put another way: As Christians, our task is to be sharers of God's light ...to be people who are busy cutting holes in the spiritual darkness of this world.

Ever since Adam disobeyed God and took a bite of that forbidden fruit, he, and all of creation was cast into a spiritual darkness that was

so thick that it permeated the very souls of all mankind, and brought sin, death, and everlasting damnation to every human being.

It was a darkness, of which no mere mortal could ever escape. As Paul once revealed: "All have sinned [are lost in spiritual darkness] and have fallen short of the glory of God." (Ro 3:23)

But the same God, who, in the beginning said,

"Let light shine out of darkness," had such a love for fallen mankind, that He sent His only Son, Jesus, to rescue us from that condemning darkness.

It was Jesus, who fulfilled God's will and commandments perfectly, and who purposely sacrificed His sinless life on the Cross so that the debt of sin would be paid. And it was Jesus, who rose victoriously from the grave so that we, too – now forgiven – would rise to a new life ...and a life everlasting!

That heart-felt knowledge and understanding of Jesus, and the salvation He accomplished for us, is the Gospel light, which broke through our darkened hearts, and brought us into His marvelous light of life!

By God's amazing grace, He created this life-giving light in our hearts, not merely for ourselves to enjoy, but that we – children of light – might be instruments of His will in spreading that Gospel-light to others.

As Christians, that's our purpose: To be ever growing in our faith; growing in the "knowledge of God's glory," so that, through God's Word, the Holy Spirit makes the light of Christ shine brightly in our lives, revealing Christ to others, and bringing glory to our Heavenly Father!

As the children sing: "Hide it under a bushel? No! I'm gonna let it shine!" – May God enable us to be and do what His light does: dispels the darkness, by bringing saving light to the lost!
